'Our Musical Minds' Royal Society Lecture

Dr Samuel Mehr is on the faculty of University of Auckland, and is also a faculty member at the Child Study Centre at Yale University in the United States of America. He is a winner of the 2023 Prime Minister's MacDiarmid Emerging Scientist Prize.

"In my research, we study the psychology of music: why it is that humans make music and listen to music and are so motivated to participate in music globally across the lifespan," Samuel explains.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow famously described music as "the universal language of mankind."

Recent insights from cognitive and developmental psychology, cross-cultural data science, and evolutionary anthropology show that he had the right idea.



Samuel will present findings from an array of studies that together demonstrate the striking universality of our musical minds.
