10:00 Speaker: Dr Graham Sattler, CEO The CSO Past, Present and Present Canterbury Symphony Orchestra

Dr Sattler will present his vision for the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra, and the trajectory the orchestra has taken since its beginnings over 65 years ago. He will talk about the orchestra's development as an integral part of the cultural and artistic infrastructure of Ōtautahi Christchurch, Te Waipounamu South Island and Aotearoa New Zealand. generally.

Dr. Graham holds qualifications in music education, conducting, opera and psychology of risk. From 2001 – 2021 Graham led Regional Conservatoriums in NSW, Australia. He spent the first three months of last year investigating best-practice musical inclusion and community music leadership training programs in the US, Canada, England, Ireland, Scotland, Norway, Portugal, and Armenia. He is a member of the International and Australian Societies for Music Education and the Asia Pacific Community Music Network.

The Geopark Bus Tour 2024

On Thursday 31st of October we were treated to an interesting and informative tour of four significant

geological sites led by Dr Sam Hampton, Geologist and Director of



At each of the four sites we were told the history of the eruption, and Sam pointed out the ancient lava flows embedded in the hills around Banks Peninsula from three major historical volcanic eruptions, the Lyttleton, Akaroa, and Mt Herbert eruptions.

Sam's explanations were clear and easy to understand and the maps he showed greatly helped in understanding the geological history of the local area and of the whole of the South and North Islands.

Stop 1:

Our first stop was at Victoria Park where we examined the outcrop of volcanic rock beneath the playground. Sam showed us geological maps of the North and South Islands which showed the geological differences between the two islands.



Stop 2:

We then went to the John Jameson Lookout near the Sign of the Bellbird and learned about the evolution of Banks Peninsula's volcanism and could see the large scale evidence within the landscape.



Stop 3:

We ate our brought lunch in Scarborough Park near the Clock Tower in the Sumner, and afterwards we had a short walk to a site by the road to examine the layers of exposed rock in the cliff face.



Stop 4:

Our last stop was at Heathcote Domain, Heathcote Valley to see the impact of earthquakes, red zoning, rockfall and mitigation.
